Philadelphia Continental Chapter Sons of the American Revolution

I have three important items to cover in this edition of the newsletter: the revisions to the Chapter's By-Laws and Constitution; initiating a lecture bureau; and the commissioning of one of our Compatriots.

THE BY-LAWS and CONSTITUTION: In the Fall Newsletter of 2017, I explained how we could change the meeting schedule of the Chapter to permit us to be more inclusive to our newer members and permit our working members to be more involved in the Chapter. We have made those changes to the By-Laws and Constitution and they have been approved by the Board of Management (BOM), including: (1) eliminated special dues treatment for members over the age of 65; clarified the treatment of mem-

bers of the Children of the American Revolution ("CAR") who are also junior members of the Chapter or who transfer in to the Chapter from the CAR; (3) eliminated the position of Surgeon, (4) clarified the procedures for amending the By-Laws; and (5) made some stylistic and grammatical changes.

The revisions made to the By-Laws were approved by the BOM and do not need to be approved by the General membership. The revisions made to the Constitution must be approved by a majority of the General membership attending a Chapter meeting. We will include that vote on the agenda of the Annual meeting on Tuesday October 2, 2018.

The changes made to the Constitution are:

<u>Art. III, Sec. 4</u>. Updated provisions regarding types of membership to conform to the By-laws of the National Society and the Pennsylvania Society.

<u>Art. VIII, Sec. 1</u>. Reduces to four (4) the mandated number of meetings each year of the members of the Chapter.

<u>Art. VIII, Sec. 6</u>. Reduces to two (2) the mandated number of meetings each year of the Board of Management.

<u>Art. VIII, Sec. 8</u>. Clarifies the methods by which notices may be provided, specifically to include notices sent by e-mail to those members reasonably believed to have e-mail addresses.

LECTURE BUREAU: One of the problems with having Posture subjects that change each year is selecting a subject in which a teacher will become interested enough to research, write a lesson plan, and then motivate their students on the topic. This year the subject for the posters is either Ben Franklin or the Continental Soldier (Minuteman). To make the research and lesson plan phase of the process easier it would be helpful if we could offer knowledgeable compatriots who could visit the classroom and do the instructing for the teacher. The students would be in the 3rd, 4th or 5th grades. If you are interested in researching these subjects or any other subject associated with the revolution, we could use you. Ideally, we should have a roster of speakers prepared to lecture on a myriad of subjects associated with the revolution. This would also make the SAR and what we do more visible to the public.

<u>A BRAND-NEW SECOND LIEUTENANT:</u> You may have seen this story in the New York Times or on CBS's Saturday Morning Show. As there is so much said and written of this subject I am concerned that almost anything I write could be considered copied from others. For that reason, I will tell the story my way.

Back during WW II, the Army found one of their Corporals of African American decent was qualified to go through Officers Candidate School (OCS) and they sent him off to school. By all accounts he was doing very well, but on the night before graduation the Army took him aside and told him that he would not be getting his commission. In the segregated Army of WW II, it was probably hard to find him a position in an African American unit. Now he comes from a family of Patriots, as one of his relatives was involved in the Revolution and wintered over with Washington at Valley Forge. In any case this Corporal took it in stride, there was a War on, and he completed the war with his unit working from North Africa to Italy.

Based upon some prodding by his daughter, Marion Lane (DAR), the Army recognized the error in its ways and **John Edward James**, **Jr.** was commissioned a Second Lieutenant at 87 and 2 weeks of age at the Museum of the American Revolution on June 29, 2018. Congratulations are in order to our fellow Compatriot James!

The Color Guard participated in the Stripes and Stars Festival, which commemorates the U.S. Army's 243rd anniversary and the American flag's 241st birthday. The festival took place on June 14 at locations throughout Independence National Historical Park and Historic Philadelphia, including Independence Hall, Betsy Ross House, Christ Church Burial Ground, and the National Constitution Center. Events included flag raising ceremonies, a patriotic parade, a swearing-in of army recruits, a dramatic skydiving performance, displays and demonstrations of U.S. Army equipment, giant flag folding activities, and a moving naturalization ceremony.



The single most important diplomatic success of the colonists during the American War for Independence was the critical link they forged with France. Representatives of the French and American governments signed the Treaty of Alliance and a Treaty of Amity and Commerce in Paris on February 6, 1778. Word of the Alliance and its ratification by the Continental Congress reached Valley Forge in early May 1778 This alliance was a major factor leading to the ultimate victory of the American colonies in the American Revolution. Every year, on the first weekend in May, Washington Memorial Chapel at Valley Forge, in accordance with Washington's instructions, commemorates the Treaty of Alliance with France, and the Color Guard and other PCC members attend.



Did You Know?

Valley Forge was Pennsylvania's first state park, established in 1893. In 1976, the bicentennial year of the Declaration of Independence, the park was transferred to the National Park System as Valley Forge National Historical Park.
